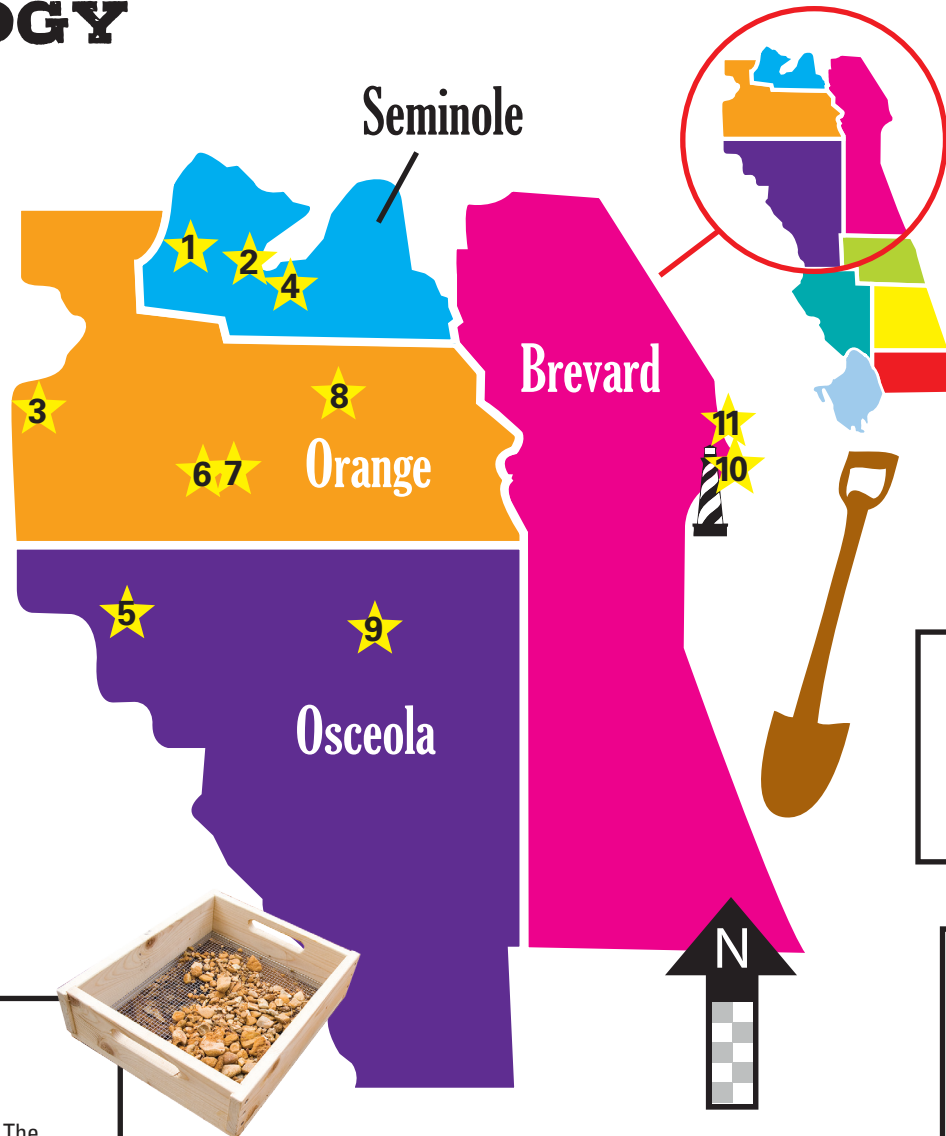

Jonathan Dickinson State Park
 16450 S.E. Federal Highway, Hobe Sound • 772-546-2771

 Named after the Quaker shipwrecked in 1696, the park was also home to the World War II radar-school Camp Murphy. Paddle the Loxahatchee River, check out the view from the observation tower or visit the interpretive center.

 Explore the archaeological evidence of 16th century survivor camps, the history of the ill-fated Spanish Plate Fleet of 1715 and other nearby submerged cultural resources.

 Tour Fort Pierce through the important sites in Hurston's life, including schools she taught at, places she worked and her grave at the Garden of Heavenly Rest Cemetery.
